

Topcliffe's New Headteacher

Mrs Abi Clay, Topcliffe School's new headteacher, is understandably feeling very positive about her new role, and is keen to enthuse about the opportunities she has inherited to build on her predecessor's success. The school motto is "learning...fun...inspiration" and she and her staff pride themselves on sharing this ethos with the children.



Recognising the importance of enhancing children's learning opportunities in and out of school, an interesting outdoor area is currently being developed for children in the Early Years. A wildlife garden will become a multi-sensory and spiritual garden, creating a Forest Schools learning site; while playtime equipment and space is being improved. This exciting project is one in which the new headteacher hopes children and parents will become very much involved..

Mrs Clay gained a degree in Business at Northampton University, a qualification which she says is proving extremely useful as a headteacher. She then studied for a PGCE from Sheffield University, followed by two terms at a school in Middlesbrough during her NQT year, completing the necessary third term at Hutton Rudby where she stayed for 13 years, leaving as Assistant Head.

With experience teaching all infant and junior years, Mrs Clay has also gained the Advanced Skills Teaching qualification, which involves supporting other teachers in their own schools to improve their own practice. Mrs Clay's particular speciality is modern languages which is now statutory for Key Stage 2. While working at Hutton Rudby, she also gained the National Professional Qualification for Headship.

Mrs Clay lived in Germany until she was 5, both her parents teaching in Forces' schools. The family then moved to North Yorkshire and she was educated at Malton School. She now lives in Raskelf with her husband, a building surveyor, and her two sons aged 6 and 7.

An avid sportswoman, Topcliffe's new headteacher is taking part in the York marathon and lists her hobbies as reading, travel and languages. She says "Topcliffe is a wonderful school with well-mannered considerate children and hardworking committed teachers and governors. This in turn creates a calm atmosphere, providing an ideal foundation for learning."

The team were walking in aid of CLIC Sargent in memory of Patrick Hooker a much-loved local boy who tragically died of cancer last November. There have been several fundraising events in his name, but because of the intense heatwave, none more arduous than this one.

Whilst trekking along the often difficult terrain of Hadrian's Wall and on occasion being forced to pitch tents when there wasn't enough room in B&B, persisting through the pain of cramp, blisters, sunburn and fatigue, their camaraderie thankfully helped them through.

The Busby Stoop garage at Carlton Miniott kindly provided a minibus for the team of indispensable supporters who ensured that there was food, water and first aid when necessary.

The next week, and following on from the walk, The Angel Inn, Topcliffe was the venue for a well-attended auction and bbq, with entertainment provided by a video of the Challenge. While there was the inevitable cheering, teasing and heckling, the loud applause at the end was full of well-deserved respect for the team's achievement.

At the last count, £4500 has been raised for the charity, far exceeding the target of £2000, and more money is still to be collected.

Jean Dickenson

Jean Dickenson, who died recently at the age of 90, was very much a Topcliffe stalwart. She lived in the village her entire life and had moved only once, from the house she had grown up in on Long Street to round the corner on Front Street.

Jean had two brothers, Jeff and Alan, (another brother, Joseph, died before her birth) and told of a happy childhood. Her father was a butcher as well as a great horse lover, an enthusiasm not shared by any of the children. Her mother was an accomplished singer and arranged training for Jean and Jeff. However, neither child showed any musical talent and while the youngest, Alan, had an attractive singing voice, he was a reticent child who declined to draw attention to himself.

There was lots of fun in the Dickenson household and a cheerful atmosphere apparently prevailed. Jean's famous sense of humour stayed with her till her final days when her various visitors to the Friarage enjoyed sharing a joke with her whether it was about her hospitalenforced cigarette deprivation or the forlorn possibility of meeting any Clooney lookalikes amongst the medics.

leaving Thirsk On school, Jean began work in the butcher's shop but when Alan and Jeff were called to serve in the Second World War, she began driving the van, delivering meat. Tragedy struck when Jeff, her handsome and academically gifted brother, contracted TB. Whilst unscathed by active service, he had returned suffering from what was at the time, a deadly illness. Sadly, his baby daughter also became fatally infected, and between the late 40s and early 50s, Jean's parents also died.

Perhaps the tragic loss of so many loved ones,

inspired Jean to begin nursing, a career which she absolutely loved. She worked at Ripon Hospital in the days of matrons and strict discipline although she typically found lots of funny anecdotes and incidents which provided her with many happy memories. She was clearly a natural carer and 50 or 60 years later she still remembered many of her patients and spoke of them fondly and with great empathy. With her new-found independence, she was free to enjoy several hobbies. She had a wide circle of friends whom she met regularly. She played golf for many years, loved to read, sew, embroider and walk. After retirement she also developed a taste for foreign travel, visiting France, Germany, Austria, Norway and Portugal.

In the 1970s Jean inherited the house on Front Street that she had shared with a relative. She loved her home and carried out various alterations to ensure that it became her own, saying that "it had grown around her." Her younger brother, Alan, lived at the top of the street and each day, would be seen visiting her on his bike, with his collie running alongside. A gentle and courteous man, Alan died about 8 years ago, leaving his wife, Eileen, and daughter, Jan.

Jean Dickenson continued to drive until she was 83 but stopped when she began to struggle with her eyesight and, in more recent years, she became partially sighted. However, she was not a complainer and sat in her chair with the radio on or dwelled on her vast supply of memories. All who visited her could be sure of a wholehearted welcome and an interesting and usually comical story, whether about her nursing days or some fascinating snippet of local history.

Despite having living for many years, she was a lady with friends of all generations. She was broad-minded, interested in new ideas and never seemed less than content with the way her life had panned out. If asked, she would probably claim with typical modesty that she had led a small life. But she hadn't. Her life had been gentle, not small, and full of interests and companionship and, in many ways, her peaceful passing was fitting for a lady with such a huge heart.

Message From Down Under

Doug Allan, who holds the remaining copies of the Millennium Book of Topcliffe, recently received an interesting letter from a descendant of a family who used to live in Topcliffe.

Richard Thwaites wrote from Australia to request a copy of the book as his ancestors lived in the village from 1830 to 1900. Richard's great- great-grandfather, George Thwaites, who was originally a local farm labourer and later a grocer in the village, is buried in St Columba's graveyard. Apparently his great-grandfather, John, who died in 1914, is probably buried in Boroughbridge, alongside his wife Phoebe (Hardwicke) Thwaites, who died in 1924.

The Australian end of the family living in Australia now numbers about fifty, and there are others in Canada and the United States. Richard is now researching his family roots and suggests he has abundant information about the Thwaites and related Rayner and Hardwicke families, which he is prepared to share with any Tattler readers who might be interested.

Having a copy of the Topcliffe Book will greatly assist Richard in understanding what life was like when his direct family lived here and in continuing his family background.

Things Could Only Get Better For Retiring Head Teacher

Wendy Shepherd described her first year as head teacher of Topcliffe School as a "difficult" one. It was certainly challenging from the outset. Margaret Whittaker, the long-serving school secretary, suffered a stroke on the first day of term. She thankfully recovered but wisely took it as a sign that it was time to retire. A new member of the teaching staff left after three weeks when her daughter became gravely ill. The school had a financial review followed by an Ofsted inspection. And, if all this wasn't daunting enough, the premises were badly flooded, resulting in a fair amount of necessary structural repair and general upheaval.

Mrs Shepherd has said that she never wanted to do anything other than teach. She was born in Harrogate and brought up in Tadcaster, going on to attend Ripon and York St John Training College where she met her future husband Graham, the retiring head teacher of Le Cateau Junior School. After working as deputy head of Bedale and of Carlton Miniott, Mrs Shepherd took over the headship of Topcliffe from Lynne Chatwin at the beginning of 2009.

Despite the traumatic beginning, Topcliffe School has benefited enormously from Mrs Shepherd's leadership. There is an atmosphere of wellbeing and cheerfulness where children are noticeably well-mannered, thoughtful and respectful. Education standards have improved dramatically with an outstanding report from Ofsted, and

the head teacher acknowledges that much of this is down to her excellent team.

UPDATE Proposed Hydro Electric Scheme by UK Hydro Ltd Topcliffe Weir

The proposed planning application by UK Hydro Ltd is currently with Harrogate Borough Council along with many comprehensive and serious points of objection.

The decision as to whether this scheme goes ahead will be made by Harrogate planning committee but at the time of writing there is no date set as to when the plans and objections will be put in front of the committee.

Whilst acknowledging that clean green renewable energy is something the UK is committing to finding sources of, the proposed Archimedes screw installation at Topcliffe weir is opposed for a variety of very valid reasons.



Neptune Service - Sunday 12th October, 10.45am

On Sunday 12th October we will welcome those who remember the RAF Neptune of Coastal Command, which flew out of RAF Topcliffe in October 1956 and sadly crashed on 10th, on the Mull of Kintyre, whilst returning from an anti-submarine course in Londonderry. After the morning service at St Columba's (10.45am), we will visit the graves of the nine crewmen who died and are buried at Winn Lane Cemetery.

All Souls - Sunday 2nd November, 6.30pm

On the weekend of 1st/2nd November we shall remember All Saints and All Souls. At our Evening Service at 6.30pm at St Columba's on Sunday 2nd November, there will be an opportunity to remember people who have died ... and who are still loved and missed, no matter how much time has passed. Names can be written on a list at the back of church. These names will then be read out during the prayers at the Evening Service. There is an open invitation to everyone to attend the service during which they will also be able, if they wish, to light a candle in memory of a loved one.

St Columba's church is open every day during the hours of daylight, and the list will be available for names to be added during the coming month, but if you want to have a name included and can't get along to church, please do give me a ring (leave a contact number in case I need to confirm a name or spelling).

These services will be followed by Remembrance Sunday itself - 9th November, 10.45, at St Columba's.
