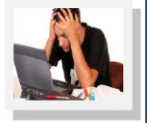

Walking 84 Miles for CLIC Sargent

Starting on July 25 for three days, a 9-man team from Topcliffe and Asenby will be walking the length of the Hadrian's Wall path, stretching 84 miles from Bowness-on-Solway to Tynemouth. Kev Young, Mark Watson, Lee Halshaw, Rob Macaulay, Chris Moores, Adam Ryan, Andrew Butler, Julian Hooker and Luke Burnett aim to walk an average of 28 miles per day; a trek which includes many miles of steep gruelling mountains.

The team hopes to raise over £2000 for CLIC Sargent, the UK's leading cancer charity for children, young people and their families. The walk is being completed in memory of Patrick Hooker, a young resident of Topcliffe who sadly died last September at the age of 13.

Also, on August 1 from 7.30pm at The Angel Inn, Topcliffe, a BBQ, auction and raffle will take place. Tickets at £6.95 are available at the bar and a further donation will be made to CLIC Sargent.

Topcliffe Parish Council

Having had very little to mention, like London buses and policemen, they all come at once. At the end of May, the parish council said thank you to Isobel Peters, who had been the parish clerk for 4 years. Isobel resigned due to additional work commitments. During her tenure, she delivered impeccable financial accounts and contributed several cost-saving measures. From June 1, the new clerk is Carrie Defty. She lives in Topcliffe with her partner and her children, who attend the school here. On behalf of the residents, welcome Carrie. May also saw the resignation of Councillor Mark Bowen for personal reasons. Mark has been a staunch supporter of the council for many years and I would like to offer, on behalf of the council, gratitude for his service and offer my personal thanks to him. No election has been called by the residents, so the council is moving to co-opt a replacement. The appointment is only until the elections in May next year. Volunteers for the position of parish councillor, please contact me. Finally, the parish council recently bought a goal for the playing field but someone almost immediately vandalised it by cutting a big hole in the net. It is very frustrating and costly to the village, that such mindless acts take place.

NYCC has announced that as of April next year, they will be cutting the roadside verges for safety reasons only. They'll withdraw the grass cutting and ground maintenance service and consequently will cease to pay the subsidy to this council for cutting the verges. This currently stands at around £700pa. The implication for Topcliffe is maintaining public amenity. We will have to find a new contractor and if current standards are to be maintained, raise the precept to cover any deficit resulting from the NYCC decision. If you have any suggestions on levels of amenity, please contact a councillor.

I have also written to NYCC Trading Standards via our local councillor, asking for action to enforce the 7.5ton weight restriction in the village and surrounding area. In response I received a lacklustre response stating in short that they do not have the resources and that it is also a low priority for the police, who need evidence to act but which we cannot supply. This response is all the more frustrating as we offered to provide volunteers to man entrances and exits (Topcliffe both ends, Busby Stoop and Baldersby St James.) and to provide following vehicles and photo evidence. The support we asked for was only 2-3 times per year, which if backed up by a concerted media campaign, may help to reduce flagrant violations. In defence of the transport industry, we have a

number of legitimate businesses requiring heavy vehicle access and when contacted have been very co-operative.

cllr.robert.baker@northyorks.gov.uk expressing your views and that there is an election next year!

Speeding I shall be writing to Hambleton and Richmond safety partnership for data equipment to be placed on Long Street and for camera enforcement action to take place. This approach has been very successful by the school.

Magna Carta The 800th anniversary of the signing of the Magna Carta beckons next year. Topcliffe has joined the Magna Carta Barons association comprising the locations of the 25 Barons appointed as sureties to ensure abeyance. Unfortunately, King John reneged after two years. The importance for Topcliffe was that Sir Richard de Percy of Topcliffe was nominated as head of the team. We are exploring a number of ideas including:

Purchase of a Magna Carta rose for Jubilee Gardens (1 of only 18)

A facsimile of Magna Carta for display (vellum or Parchment)

Village signage "A Magna Carta village". We are currently awaiting decision on a motif.

We are also looking at the market cross area to see what might be done but we have difficulty in tracing through stakeholders.

There is talk of parades and markets

We shall be setting up a Magna Carta sub-committee in the near future to steer events. If you would like to participate, please contact me.

Finally, this summer term we say farewell to Wendy Shepherd who is retiring as Head Teacher at the school. We wish her and her husband a long, active and healthy retirement. And a warm welcome to the new Head Teacher, Abi Clay.

For us at St Columba's it was a time of double celebration. Not only did we give thanks for the gift of the Holy Spirit, and that sense of God resting in the heart of each one of us, but we also remembered St Columba, our patron saint, who died on 9th June in AD597. St Columba originated from Ireland, but eventually found his way to Iona, that tiny island off the Isle of Mull, off the west coast of Scotland.
