

Saving the Planet from the Comfort of your own Garden

Saving the Planet can be a chore. One of those things you just keep putting off, like clearing out the old paint tins from the shed or cleaning the cutlery drawer in the kitchen. You know it needs doing but it's just not fun. Recycling is a word that's become, let's face it, a bit boring. There's the not insignificant problem in Topcliffe of having to drive four miles to take recyclable items to the tip which means that you actually need your own transport to save the planet. Also, there are all those bins hanging round street corners like disaffected teenagers, and even more malodorous than well-worn trainers. Recycling - a good idea that could have done with a bit of thought before we started putting it into effect, rather than waiting until the whole exercise had become somewhat tedious and complicated.


However, it is possible to do some recycling without leaving carbon footprints all the way down the A168. Get a reduced-price compost bin by calling 0845 077 0757 or visit www.recyclenow.com/compost.

Making good compost relies on a good mixture of "greens and browns". Greens are quick to rot and are rich in moisture and nitrogen and provide the fuel for the composting process. Browns are slower to rot, are dry and rich in carbon. Browns provide the air and structure Greens could include uncooked process. vegetable peelings and fruit waste, tea bags, plant prunings and grass cuttings. Browns could include dried flowers, woody stems, cardboard and paper. Cooked vegetables, meat, dairy products, plants, animal excrement or nappies should not be Aerate the compost with a fork or by mixing in scrunched-up paper and card. The compost is ready to use when it resembles dark soil and has a sweet, earthy smell which usually takes six to twelve months.

If you have trouble getting into Thirsk or Ripon, and you're an enthusiastic reader, take advantage of the Mobile Library Service which stops in Topcliffe and Asenby every three weeks. All mobiles have improved access for people with mobility problems with wide doors and passenger lifts.

To join the mobile library, just visit the vehicle taking with you documentation bearing your name and address such as a utility bill. Your membership card can also be used at any branch library in North Yorkshire. You can request books or CD's that aren't immediately available and you can return books borrowed from a mobile at any branch library. The mobile visits every three weeks but if you miss the visit and have borrowed books you wish to return, just take them into your local library or telephone the library to extend the loan.

The next visit is scheduled for June 7 and will stop at Fosse Bungalow, Asenby between 14.10 and 14.15 and Jamesville Way between 14.20 and 14.40. It will be at East Lea in Topcliffe between 14.45 and 14.55. This is a very good service and, if it is difficult to use the official stops, ring 01609 533800 as it may be possible to arrange somewhere more convenient.

'James Herriot' play comes to the village - 18th August:

The Topcliffe Educational Foundation

The Topcliffe Educational Foundation is a charity which makes small grants for the purchase of books, to students who have recently left school and are in their first degree course at University or the equivalent.

To be eligible, the student must live in the parish of Topcliffe, which is broadly the area covered by the parish as now constituted together with Marton le Moor.

The Charity's income is fixed and limited, therefore the value of any single grant will depend not only on the funds available to distribute but also on the number of successful applications.


Applications are sought in September/October and the Trustees meet in December to approve grants. Students who have received grants in previous years will automatically receive an invitation to apply for 2007.

On Saturday May 12th another successful Attic Auction, organised by John Phillips with the help of a willing band of helpers, raised a further £800 for the fund. We have a long way to go before we can feel that we are getting on top of the many problems that face us but we will increase our endeavours to this end. Our next major task is to repair the leaking roof. We are still trying for a grant from English Heritage to make this possible.

We are pleased that the clock is now going again. Work continues on this project thanks to Mr. Robert Place. We are still raising funds to complete all the work required. The delay in completing Stage 1 of the restoration of the Churchyard wall is because of difficulties in the supply of new coping stones. However these are on order and this task should be completed shortly

Once again we stress the importance of ensuring that children do not play in Churchyard and in particular that they do not jump off the wall. We do like to see the Church and it's environs used by the inhabitants – after all it is your Church – but it is not a playground.
