

# **Classics at St. Columba's**

The next classical concert at St. Columba's will be on Sat 17th June in Church at 7.30pm. The programme is;

Benjamin Britten - Sonata for Cello and Piano Op. 65
Franz Schubert - Sonata in A Minor for Arpeggione (Cello) and Piano, D. 821
Johannes Brahms - Piano Trio in B Major

and we have three absolutely wonderful performers;

Matthew Lowe (Cello), ex Scholar at the Royal College of Music and now a postgraduate at The Guildhall, who this year won the London Symphony Award to play as a member of the orchestra - he also plays regularly with he BBC Symphony Orchestra.

Alasdair Beaston (Piano), a graduate with highest honours from the Royal College of Music, thereafter studying at Bloomington USA with Pressler - pianist of the Beaux Arts Trio. Since his return to the UK he has won international prizes and played recitals (inc Wigmore Hall) and concertos in many parts of the world.

Eleanor Fagg (Violin), also a postgraduate at the RCM, was principal of the National Youth Orchestra, recently playing with the LSO and winner in 2005 of the 'Emily English Scholarship' awarded by the Musicians Benevolent fund to the most outstanding violinist heard at audition.

This is another very special concert and will no doubt be a real delight. Tickets are £8, concessions £6, and children £4 and are available from John Phillips on 01845 577034

There will also be a concert in Church on Monday 21st August at 7.30 pm. This will be given by "Mean Time", an ensemble of four graduate musicians from Trinity College of Music, London, specialising in work with the Recorder spanning the Mediaeval, Renaissance and Baroque periods. Their recital is entitled 'The Birds and the B's'..... a chirping, twittering and buzzing programme of Cuckoos, Nightingales, Finches and Bumble Bees, exploring birdsong, love and nature - and composers beginning with B! Including music by Bach, Couperin, Finch, Uccellini, Rore and, of course, Byrd!!

The group perform regularly in London and other parts of the country and their concerts are described as light hearted and accessible to everybody.

### **TATTLER WALKS NUMBER 1.** STUDLEY PARK AND THE RIVER SKELL


This pleasant, easy family walk passes through some familiar territory on the west side of Ripon, and is also accessible from Topcliffe and Asenby by public transport. The distance is between 5 and 6 miles [depending on route] and there are no steep hills.

If using a car, park at the roadside in Mallorie Park Drive in Ripon, near the junction with High Cleugh [avoiding the yellow lines] and walk back along the path by the River Laver to a wooden footbridge that crosses the Skell just below it's confluence with the Laver, turning right after crossing the river.

For the next half mile or so, the route is through a mixture of woodland and open areas, full of birdsong in spring and pungent with the scent of wild garlic – or 'stinking nanny' as we called it down in the west country. Several paths wind through this area, but if you keep within the sound of the river, you will eventually emerge on to Hell Wath Lane opposite Hell Wath Cottage. This is an odd name and I'm not sure of it's origin, but the word 'Wath' is common enough locally and usually refers to a ford across a river.

Turn left at the cottage for 200 yds or so to a junction of roads at the edge of the housing estate, then right into a country lane [Whitcliffe Lane] where a public bridleway sign indicates your route. Walk along this quiet lane – probably accompanied by the sounds of blackbirds, dunnocks and wrens, passing two farm entrances on the left. A hundred yards or so beyond Whitcliffe Hall leave the road, turning right at a gate to take the path across a field by a line of small trees, where a sign indicates that this is part of the 'Ripon Rowel' route.

At the far end of the field a hand gate leads into woodland and down to a junction of tracks, where you should go downhill to the right and soon reach a fording place over the Skell. Wet feet will not be necessary as there is a footbridge to the left. Our route now turns to the left and follows the Skell upstream into Studley Park. However, if you are footsore already, you could head straight on from the ford to emerge in Studley Roger village. A deer gate allows entry to the park, then along the delightful 'Valley of the Seven Bridges' [I suggest you count them]. Please observe notices about keeping dogs on leads as the park has several hundred deer.



In dry periods the Skell disappears altogether here as it sinks into the Magnesian limestone. Once you reach the ornamental lake there are a variety of options. At the far end is the café and toilets, whilst you are free to wander at will in the park maybe calling in at the ornate Victorian church or viewing the deer, which number approximately 60 sika and around 450 red and fallow [roughly 60/40 red to fallow]. In June you might be lucky enough to see newly born fawns in quieter parts of the park. If you do, then please do not touch and keep dogs well away. In autumn the red stags are busy with the rut, roaring impressively and covering themselves with a fragrant 'after shave' mix of mud and urine to attract the hinds. At this time it

is advisable not to get too close to stags as they can be aggressive.

Once you have completed your wanderings, head down the main drive towards the east gate, noting how the drive was designed to line up perfectly with Ripon Minster. Before reaching the lodges, bear left to a point about 200 yds along the wall to where a gate and path lead directly into Studley Roger village.

To complete the walk, cross the road, go down a drive past April Cottage, then along a well maintained path that leads directly back to the B6265 close to the edge of Ripon and Mallorie Park Drive. Allow a minimum of 3 hours + extra time for wandering through the park, visiting the café, feeding the ducks etc.

Note: If using the bus, you will need to add  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles to the walk for the extra bit to and from the city centre.

### Wanted - Clerk to Topcliffe Parish Council

Topcliffe Parish Council is seeking to appoint a Clerk commencing July 2006. The council is considering applying for 'Quality Council Status' as it meets every criteria for this status apart from a 'Qualified Clerk' and 80% elected councillors.

The position is part time, currently 14 hours per month and attracts a current salary of over £5 per hour. This however, will be reviewed through qualification to the YLCA recommended level of over £7ph post qualification. Non qualified applicants who wish to apply there are funds available to undertake the AQA qualification course with the University of Cheltenham and Gloucester.

Applicants will be required to take minutes of meetings, draft and respond to correspondence to and from the council, make telephone enquiries, undertake basic book keeping and demonstrate a keen desire to develop knowledge of local council administration and above all, a willingness to serve the local community.

# **The Topcliffe Educational Foundation**

The Topcliffe Educational Foundation is a charity which makes small grants for the purchase of books, to students who have recently left school and are in their first degree course at University or the equivalent. To be eligible, the student must live in the parish of Topcliffe, which is broadly the area covered by the parish as now constituted together with Marton le Moor.

The Charity's income is fixed and limited, therefore the value of any single grant will depend not only on the funds available to distribute but also on the number of successful applications.

Applications are sought in September/October and the Trustees meet in December to approve grants. Students who have received grants in previous years will automatically receive an invitation to apply for 2006.
