Topcliffe residents have been saying their farewells to the Rev'd Christine Haddon-Reece and her husband, David, who are leaving the village after almost twelve years. Their last service was, perhaps appropriately, on Remembrance Sunday.

The Rev'd Christine Haddon-Reece didn't leave school with a religious career in mind but began work at sixteen first in an office and then a children's library. She eventually decided to go to Theological College for a year, then went on to take the entrance exam for Nottingham University, completing her degree in 1981. She started her theological career as a deaconess but in 1994 she was ordained as one of the first batch of women priests - a move which would have been controversial at the time and suggests her softlyspoken and gentle manner belies a focused determination.

The newly-ordained Vicar worked in Sunderland, Hartlepool and the Lastingham group of churches before moving to Topcliffe.

There have been many successful projects during her ministry in the Topcliffe Benefice. She was moved by the dedication of Baldersby St James' embroiderers who provided their church with a beautiful communion kneeler whilst the St James' spire underwent massive restoration work. The re-lighting scheme at St Columba's was well under way before the Vicar and her husband arrived but his expertise and enthusiasm provided some fresh energy and motivation. The tower restoration project was also a truly overwhelming task but on a sunny April day in 2005, an unforgettable service of thanksgiving, commemorating its completion, was presided over by the Bishop of Whitby. Meanwhile a committee from the choir undertook a scheme to replace the organ with the wonderful Father Willis instrument which had been rescued from a collapsing church in Sheffield.

Whilst the many projects and auctions, guizzes and concerts have been memorable, Christine insists that working with children in the village schools preparing them for or Confirmation has been supremely rewarding. She has felt privileged to share happy family occasions such as weddings and baptisms, but has also empathised with the bereaved and the sick. Her words of comfort and concern have touched the lives of many in the area and she will be greatly missed.

During her years working in the Lastingham group of churches, the Vicar lived in Rosedale and it was during this time, she met her husband, David. He trained for the Ministry and became



a Reader but he is also the lighting advisor for the diocese of York and a fully qualified electrical engineer. He shares many of his wife's hobbies, walking, gardening, reading, the theatre and cinema and visiting historical buildings. He is also keen on ancient languages and heraldry and, in the past, worked for English Heritage.

Christine and David acknowledge they'll miss the good friends they've made in Topcliffe and the surrounding villages but feel that the time is right to move. Thinking ahead, they look forward to their eventual retirement in the Rosedale area - but say that's in the future. For now they have more rewarding work to undertake, more projects to oversee and more kind words and prayers to share with their new congregation.

Any Asenby residents (or their relatives) wishing to fish our river *must* be in possession of one of the four official licences. Each of these displays the name and telephone number of the holder. These licences can be obtained by contacting Grahame Marsden at 578156 (48 hours in advance). People wishing to fish *must* be in possession of a valid "rod fishing licence" (obtained from the post office). Both licences must be carried whist on the river bank. N.B. There is no fishing allowed (by law) for course fish between 15th March and 15th June incl.

Topcliffe Pharmacy under attack?

In early November, you may have received a leaflet from the local Conservative Party, suggesting, that as a result of a Government review, the pharmacy at Topcliffe Surgery was under threat of closure.

Whilst the information given in the leaflet may have been relevant to dispensing doctors in towns where other pharmacies are in existence within a mile of a practice, it <u>does not</u> apply to Topcliffe, as the nearest pharmacy is about 5 miles away. There is no immediate concern that the Topcliffe pharmacy will close.

In April of this year, the Government published a white paper entitled "Pharmacy in England". This document describes how the Government sees the development of pharmacies to provide improved services. The paper includes several suggestions for removing some of the anomalies in the current system for the regulation of pharmacies, and amongst these is a proposal to obtain a better spread of pharmacies by preventing "clustering". It is this proposal which, if implemented, could result in some pharmacies, including those of dispensing doctors, being forced to close. However, these closures are most likely to take effect in local market towns.

The situation for Topcliffe is very different, as there is no other pharmacy nearby. Currently, Topcliffe Surgery can dispense to all registered patients who live more than one mile from a pharmacy. This means that the majority of patients pick up their medication at the surgery. One of the proposals in the white paper suggests that doctor's pharmacies should be allowed to dispense to <u>all</u> of their patients, irrespective of where they live, provided there is not a pharmacy within say, one mile of the surgery. This would mean that all patients registered at Topcliffe could get their medication at the surgery.

As with all change, there will be winners and losers; there is no guarantee that things will not change in the future, but it would appear, that if the proposals in the white paper are adopted, then Topcliffe is in a winning situation. There is even a proposal in the white paper that dispensing doctors will be allowed to sell "over the counter" medicines which could save you another trip into town.

Topcliffe Surgery is doing well, providing a service which is significantly above the national average and the pharmacy is very much open for business.

This past year has seen great progress in some areas and less so in others. The installation of the new greenhouse at the school has started and our thanks go to Severfield – Reeve Projects Ltd for agreeing to install it. If anyone wishes to donate seeds, plants, grow bags and tools etc, I am sure that they would be gratefully received by the school.

The replacement of the play park swings has not progressed as quickly as we would have liked. We have had several quotes, ranging from merely expensive to stratospherically expensive, so we have invited re-tenders. We may now have to await the spring for installation, which brings grant funding from Hambleton into doubt for this year, as all projects have to be completed by 10 March. The playing field sub-committee has great ambitions; some drawings have been done and fundraising activity is underway, although in the current financial climate, it is likely to be tough going. The committee is always looking for volunteers, so please contact Lauren on 578989.

The sheepwash is available for fishing, and if anyone is inclined to help, it needs some care and maintenance, especially around the benches and the fishing areas. This is a rare and valuable resource, so please use it much as you can. Rod licenses can be purchased at the Post Office.

The parish council has approved the budget for next year and frozen the precept.
