



School Report by Simon Ashby (Headteacher)

The school is once again taking part in a number of collection schemes this term for which we would be very grateful for any support from villagers. Tesco "Computers for Schools" vouchers are out again. In each of the last two years we have been able to purchase a brand new computer for school at no cost due to this scheme, and we are hopeful that this can be achieved again. We are also collecting "Free Books Schools" vouchers which can be found on packets of Walkers



crisps and in the Sun and News of the World newspapers. If you are able to collect towards either of these schemes for the school, we would be extremely grateful.

The Friends of Topcliffe School will be organising another collection of used clothing over the Easter holidays. In October we raised a superb £180, so if you have any old surplus clothing, why not wait for the blue bags to come round at the beginning of April.

FOTS have had an extremely successful year raising funds for the school. The most recent event was the Autumn Fayre at Topcliffe Village Hall in November which raised over £900. Many thanks if you were able to support this. The money raised is being put to very good use, and is enabling us to purchase a special projector which allows a computer screen to viewed by a whole class. FOTS are also purchasing an amp and microphone for the school, which will be very useful at public events, school performances and discos. We have already set the date of Saturday 28th June for our Summer Fayre, so please make a note in your diaries.

We are further strengthening our links with Topcliffe Pre-School Playgroup this term. Children who will be starting school in

September are being invited into the Reception class on four afternoons before Easter, to help smooth the transition from playgroup. For the first time in many years, we will be admitting a full quota of 20 pupils in September which is a very exciting prospect.

Year 5 & Year 6 children had an unexpected surprise on a recent trip to York Minster. Whilst waiting outside at the start of the day, a BBC film crew descended and thrust them on to the nation's screens during a live feed in which they were questioned about the state of Britain. It was only 30 seconds of stardom – but very exciting for the children nonetheless.

Finally, the school has now received further details of its planned redevelopment of the school hall. A further bid to the New Opportunities Fund will have to be submitted, but we are confident that a grant in the region of £50000 will be forthcoming and that work should be able to go ahead early in 2004. Currently we are also looking into the possibility of extending other parts of the school at the same time.



The placing of the contract to carry out the work to St. Columba's Church is good news indeed, but it brings into focus the task of the people of Asenby and Topcliffe, who together are responsible for repairing the valuable clock, and re-furbishment and re-setting of the bells. The clock is valuable, being the oldest surviving one of its kind made by Thomas Cook, three earlier ones having been destroyed.

The £2 per week scheme for local residents being run, organised and supervised by the Vice-Chairman of the Parish Council, John Graham, has been a considerable success throughout the village. It is hoped that this will continue and that more residents will subscribe in this way.

Fund-raising events for 2003 will be Wine Tasting on Friday 21st March, 8 p.m. in the Village Hall, an Attic Auction also in the Village Hall on Saturday 10th May. A 'possible' is a 'Clock Evening' in the Church, (as the Clock would probably be of considerable interest to some of the Clock Societies in the area). Other suggestions are a Play performed by a Theatre Group, a Harvest Barn Dance, Car Treasure Hunt finishing with a Barbecue, and a Sunday Lunch for the residents of both villages These suggestions will be further discussed and decided on later.
