EDITORIAL

Toxocariasis is caused by the larvae of parasitic worms that usually live in the intestines of dogs and cats. Eggs from the Toxocara worms pass into the stools of dogs and cats and can contaminate areas where the animals have defecated. The eggs can be swallowed by young children, especially those who love to put things in their mouths and who may not often wash their hands. Once Toxocara eggs enter a child's body, they hatch into larvae that penetrate through walls of the digestive tract and may migrate to a child's liver, lungs, eyes, and elsewhere.

Toxocariasis usually affects children under age ten. Symptoms may include fever, cough or wheezing, abdominal pain, enlarged liver or spleen, poor appetite, a rash that sometimes looks like hives, and enlarged lymph nodes ("swollen glands"). Toxocariasis may also affect a child's eyes, causing decreased vision, swelling around the eyes, or a cross-eyed appearance.

It all sounds quite horrible and yet despite the fact that most adults are aware of the dangers, some dog owners still do not "scoop the poop". Sadly, the worst affected area in Topcliffe seems to be School Lane/ Back Lane, which of course is regularly used by young children going to and from school.

I don't see too many stray dogs in Topcliffe so I assume that most dogs are accompanied when they defecate. So, come on you dog owners, make sure you have your plastic bag(s) when you leave home and remember to clean up after **your** dog. Now the light nights are here, you don't need a torch to find it! Let's make the place safe for the children.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The TATtler makes no excuses for beating the drum again regarding keeping down crime in Topcliffe and Asenby. Long overdue changes to the system by which information is passed to your Neighbourhood Watch coordinator are underway and the Police hope to have a state of the art system in place very soon. Hopefully this will allow the co-ordinators to give you accurate information more quickly so we can all be aware of criminal activity in the area.

Major concerns that the police have at present relate to break-ins where car keys are taken and vehicle is then stolen from the drive. Nothing taken from the house, just the motor! So is your garage full of rubbish instead of your car, and where were your car keys last night? These crimes are generally targeted at high value vehicles, possibly stolen to order. Why not save a few pounds on your insurance and make room for the car in the garage, oh, and take the keys to bed with you! Another big issue at present is Bogus Doorstep Callers. A large number of initiatives are underway to stop the growing menace of these rogue traders, and national & local government, the police, media and other agencies & businesses are all doing their bit to improve the situation. Don't let yourself become a victim. Keep all your doors locked, fit a chain or bar on the door and use it, only deal with callers by appointment, always ask for an identity card and check it carefully and **do not** keep large sums of money at home.

Also, know your rights. Generally speaking if the seller makes contact with you first and the goods or services cost more than £35, then you have a right to cancel within seven days. If you make a doorstep purchase and are unhappy about your commitment, seek advice from Trading Standards before it is too late!

If you should have any concerns about any unsolicited caller, apart from notifying the Police, you can get in touch with Trading Standards who now have a rapid response unit based in Northallerton, Tel.

TOPCLIFFE PARISH COUNCIL AGM - A REPORT

The Annual General Meeting of Topcliffe P.C. took place on Monday 10th May at 7.30 pm in the village hall. Attendance was disappointing, with only 14 people, including the Councillors, present!

The meeting followed a road show put on by N.Y. Police and Fire & Rescue services and Hambleton Council and NYCC. The road show was mainly directed at helping householders to improve home security, both from a fire safety and the criminal activity point of view, and the AGM itself was preceded by talks from the Police and Trading Standards officers regarding initiatives being taken to improve the Neighbourhood Watch scheme and crack down on bogus doorstep callers.

Changes to the Neighbourhood Watch system will mainly affect the way information is disseminated amongst the NW co-ordinators. As for bogus callers, Trading Standards are stepping up the programme to rid the community of these parasites. Amongst various steps being taken, banks and building societies are to adopt a protocol, which will result in them querying large withdrawals made by old and vulnerable people.

On the subject of avoiding being a victim of crime, it would be helpful if residents whose properties have burglar alarms fitted, could make arrangements for a responsible person to have the means to silence the alarm should they be away from home. Ideally a neighbour could help or at least have the 'phone number of the key holder.

Other village issues discussed at the meeting and of general interest were Speeding, the Tollbooth and the Sheepwash. Many of you would have noticed the data recording strips, which were put down outside the school and The Angel, way back in March. Data from these has now been analysed and it was found that 85% of the traffic is travelling at 35 mph or less. There were however, several vehicles, which were significantly over the limit, and NY Police intend to take the appropriate action to address this problem. As far as traffic-calming measures are concerned, the figures no not warrant any further action from NYCC.

The development of the Tollbooth for the Community Engagement Project as outlined in the Spring TATtler is underway. The children themselves have completed much of the preparatory work required for Phase 1 and they deserve to be congratulated for their efforts. In order to progress things, assistance is required from electrical engineers for advice and paid work. If you are willing to assist then please contact Garry Key on 578900.

The project is also likely to get professional youth worker support amounting to about 35 hours over the next 15 - 20 weeks. The youth workers will assist the children and help them to shape their future, coalesce & articulate views and generally act as mentors. This is over and above the £1,000 grant, which has already been allocated to the project.

As for the Sheepwash, arrangements are to be made with the assistance of the Thirsk Woodland Trust to replant the trees in this area with varieties more suitable to the location. Regarding improving the appearance of things, it would be appreciated if residents adjacent to kerbs which are not subject to roadside cleaning, could assist the parish by keeping the kerbside swept. This is literally a 10-minute jobs a few times a year. Your co-operation with this small item could avoid an increase in the Topcliffe precept to cover additional maintenance costs.

Other items of interest to young people are the Alanbrooke Barracks youth club, which may be used by local children. Details of this are being sought from camp personnel and will be passed on when available. Additionally, in response to many requests, a pair of ³/₄ size goalposts has been ordered for the playing field.
